RESIGNED!

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EDUCATION IS SICK

Education, like people, is subject to various ills and maladies. Even now education is suffering from a disease which the doctors of learning have, until recently, been unable to diagnose. However, at a recent meeting of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Students, Dr. C. C. Colvert, in collaboration with Professor W. R. Hammonds, advanced a theory containing the basic causes of the present ills of education.

The above mentioned nationally known doctors of education have advanced the theory that there is a drastic drain upon the modern university's knowledge treasury. In the past, the chief source of knowledge revenue of the important colleges lay in the fact that the freshmen always brought some learning to the school and the seniors never took any away. In this manner, the ledger of the school always showed a surplus. However, with the increase in number of professors, this situation has changed. The guardians of the university's knowledge vaults have become so lax in their work, that the student, like a sponge, cannot help but absorb and take away from his Alma Mater more knowledge than he brought in his freshman year. It is estimated by numerous statisticians that the continuation of this condition will result in a complete drainage of knowledge from the modern universities.

In order to remedy this situation, Dr. Colvert and Professor Hammond have proposed two courses of actions: a change in the personnel of the schools, and the discontinuation of the publication and purchase by schools of new books. Dr. Colvert sincerely believes that if no professor is allowed to have more than two years of higher education, and that if these two years are obtained in an obscure college, the situation might be partly remedied.

If the professors were selected with these qualifications, the amount of knowledge possessed by the schools could be more easily safeguarded; the professor would be less likely to expose to the students the valuable information possessed by the school. Professor Hammond believes that if no more books containing valuable information were published, the public would be less likely to receive knowledge which rightfully belongs in the vaults of the institutions of higher learning. It is further believed that the modern university has at present as much knowledge as it can adequately protect. To remedy this, the schools should purchase no more books. Moreover, greater care should be taken in keeping the students from trespassing in the library, one of the main vaults of university learning. To further protect the prestige of the school, the libraries should be firmly locked and placed under guard, only to be opened at the pleasure of eminent visiting potentates. This would prevent one of the greatest leakages on University knowledge.

It is obvious, in view of the existing conditions, that if the plan outlined by Dr. Colvert and Professor Hammond is not adopted, modern education is fast going to ruin. These plans constitute the only means by which modern universities and colleges can again be made stable.

THE WORLD'S MOST FAMOUS COLLEGE

Northeast Center has become world famous. No longer is the magnificent institution just a mere sectionally-known college, but its merits are upon the lips of everyone. The student body has grown until applicants have to pass a rigid examination, and Dr. C. C. Colvert is turning down crowds of students each semester.

Other colleges are seeking to find Northeast Center's new formula for success, but all attempts seem to be in vain. Never will other colleges succeed in gaining a portion of Northeast Center's greatness, for they are off on the wrong track.

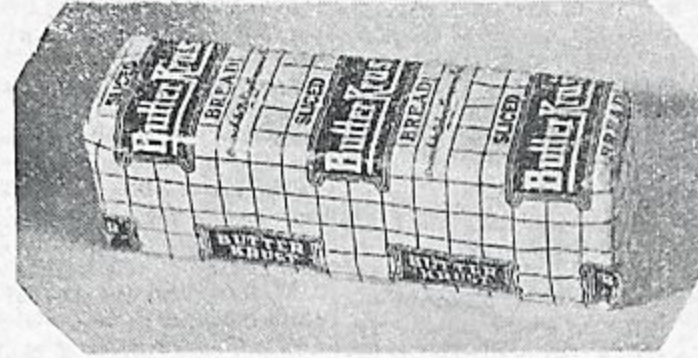
