N'East Students See Theatre Production At Vicksburg, Miss.

A group of Northeast students and faculty members visited Vicksburg, Mississippi recently to witness the Vicksburg Little Theatre's presentation of "Gold In The Hills' 'or the "Dead Sister's Secret."

Every spring during the month of March, the Dixie Showboat Players, aboard the Steamer Sprague, which is anchored permanently in the Mississippi River, offer their Gay Nineties Melodramas for the entertainment of local citizens and tourists who find the historical city fascinating.

In 1936, the feeling that Vicksburg, Mississippi and Showboats were synonomous, the Little Theatre recaptured the pompadour and parasol, Gay Ninety era by launching their Dixie Showboat performance that has rapidly become a tradition.

During the past 20 years an estimated 80,000 people have applauded the river boat revelry. A long-time dream of the Vicksburg Little Theatre has been realized: to keep visitors traveling to their city and to entertain them with something as "native as catfish" and to keep alive the American institution the "floating palace"—"the show boat"—that plied our rivers long ago.

Mr. Parkerson's contribution to the meeting was a speech on how debates should be judged. Mr. Blue worked with a committee concerned with speech correction.


