

The Northeast family, 2,200 students, faculty and staff, is eagerly-awaiting the Christmas Holidays and the opportunity


for each of us to rejoin our respective families.


Christmas is a time for putting aside petty disagreements with others and conducting ourselves toward our associates as we do our families, with a genuine affection that over-rides mi-





700 Students Science Meet Turn Out For

Approximately 700 high school students attended the "Northeast Louisiana Science Exposition" Friday, December 13 on the Northeast campus.

Most of the visiting students from area high schools were studying biology, general science, chemistry and physics. They viewed practical demonstrations in science conducted by the college and co-operating industrial firms

Among the interesting displays were a model of an atomic power plant exhibited by the Louisiana Power and Light Company and a wildlife scene displayed by the State Wildlife and Fisheries department.

The exposition is an annual event at Northeast and is designed to promote interest in science.
