# NE Military Begins New Year With Increase in Enrollment

Many freshmen are getting their first taste of military training this year in the ROTC program here at Northeast State College. The cadet corps, first started here in 1950, has 512 members this year-an increase of 159 over last year's enrollment.

The senior 4-year program was set up here the same year that Northeast became a 4-year college. Prior to then, Northeast college assisted in World War II efforts by conducting pro-grams for civilian pilot training, Army specialized training for engineers, nurses training, and Army reserve officers' training (junior division).

The cadet corps was reor-ganized last year from an Infantry Battalion into a Battle Group. This reorganization conformed with the PENTOMIC concept set up by Army regulations.

There are four companies in the Battle Group this year, plus the band. The most outstanding company is cited each week as Honor Company, and an out-standing cadet is selected each week as Honor Cadet.

An outstanding event each year is Federal Inspection, when Army officials inspect and rate the cadet corps. Last year the Northeast Battle Group received a rating of "Excellent."

Two military organizations have been formed on the campus; the Pershing Rifles and the Scabbard and Blade.

The cadets will be instructed on preliminary facings, movements, etc., until October 16, when they will begin using M-1 rifles.

A girl is elected each semester as sponsor for each company, for each platoon, for the the Pershing Rifles, the Scabbard and Blade, and the entire Battle Group. The girl serving as Battle Group sponsor is known as the "Little Colon-

# FBI Holds Officers' School at Northeast

Peace Officers from the Northeast Louisiana area are attending the F. B. I. Police In-Service Training School at Northeast State College. The classes are sponsored by the LSU Extension Service.

The classes, under the direction of veteran F. B. I. Agent Farris Jones, are held each Tuesday night from 6 until 9 o'clock in the Science Building. This is a 17 week basic course, and classes are taught by welltrained and experienced F. B. I. Agents, District Attorneys, Attorneys, State Police Commanders, and others.

Upon completion of course, each officer will be awarded a certificate from LSU, and given the opportunity to attend another 17 week advanced course that is to be held here at the college next semes-

# **NE Students Attend** Conference at LSU

The Intercollegiate Forensics Conference is slated to be held October 10-11, 1958 at Louisiana State University.

The topic of discussion will "What Should Be the Policy of the Nations of the World Toward Further Development of Nuclear Weapons?" At the conference there will be three types of speaking; group discussion, one-half day; individual speeches, one day; and a caucus for one-half day in which resolutions will be drafted and then debated in a legislative body.

This conference will launch the debate season in four states: Louisiana, Texas, Tennessee, and Mississippi.

According to James W. Parkerson, assistant professor of speech and director of debate,



There will be an assembly Wednesday, October 8 at 4:15 in the ampitheatre for all women interested in rush.



# **NEW TRAMPOLINE CLASS PROVES** POPULAR ON NORTHEAST CAMPUS

Something new has been added to the Health and Physical Education department here. Twenty-one men students are enrolled in Northeast's initial trampoline class offered at 12 noon on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, with Coach Lewis Hartzog as the instructor.

The men are taught five basic movements on the trampoline. Beginning with the feet bounce, the" tyros" progress to the sit

drop, knee drop, back drop and front drop. As the students become proficient in these steps they will be able to perform many variations.

# NE Sports Classes Extend to City

Two activity classes at Northeast State College this Fall will extend to the city of Monroe. Bowling and golf, taught by Coaches Bob DeMoss and Geo. Luffey, will meet at the Monroe Bowling Center and the Municipal Golf Course.

Coach DeMoss' bowling classes have 39 students enrolled and meet at 11 to 12 p.m. Monday through Thursday at the Monroe Bowling Center. Under the direction of Keith Moore, the students learn to bowl by the "Spot" method used by the champions. Beginners are started out on how to handle the delivery, how to pick up splits and how to establish handicaps for bowling tournaments.

The classes will work on form during the first half of the semester; the second half will be devoted to tournament play between members of the classes. The bowling students also get a special rate at the Bowling Center in the afternoons to practice for the class.

Coach Luffey's instructions in golf are offered at 10 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday; 12 to 2 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday; 12 to 2 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday. The total enrollment in the classes is approximately ninety. The classes are held at the Municipal Golf Course with the cooperation of golf pro Hugh Britt and city officials.

This is a beginner's course teaching the termonology of the sport and the fundamentals—grip, stance and swing. The classes will play several rounds of golf before the semester is over, according to Coach Luffey. The green fee has been waivered by city officials and the golf clubs are furnished by the college this year for the first time.

The Agriculture Department is offering a new course called Forestry 51. The course is Farm Woodlot Management, which includes the handling of the farm lot for the production of fuel, post merchantable products and erosion control. This new class has 8 students and will be offered every other year.




