
NLSC Fusileers Are Activated

The annual Military Awards Day ceremony was highlighted last Thursday by the activation of the Northeast Louisiana State College "Fusi-leers," a precision drill team composed of members of the ROTC Cadet Brigade.

Dr. George T. Walker formally activated the unit by presenting a charter to their commander, cadet Robert I. Ballard of West Monroe. Spectators at the ceremony were then treated to a sample exhibition of the "Fusileer's" precision drill routines, which included such move-ments as the "Marching Manual of Arms" and the "Rifle Toss". These and other precision movements will and other precision movements will be featured this Fall during the half-time ceremonies at Northeast's home football games; and in other local parades and ceremonies in which the "Fusileers" will participate.



ROTC Cadets Are Honored At Awards Day Ceremony

Northeast State paid tribute Thursday to the cadets of the Reserve Officers Training Corps who have distinguished themselves by their achievements during the current school year.

The event was the annual Military Awards Day.

Among the many awards presented was the Superior Cadet Ribbon, which is presented annually to the outstanding cadet in each class. The award was presented by Dr. William R. Hammond to cadets col. Elbert W. Dyer, Monroe; It. Arville W. Steed, Shreveport; M/sgt. Robert M. Kemp, West Monroe; and sgt. Robert J. Pfrimmer, Monroe.

The President's Medal was presented by Dr. George T. Walker to the cadet in each class who had attained the highest academic average in his class and an average of "B" or better in his military science course during the past year. Honors went to cadets capt. Jimmy T. Arnold, Crowville; It. Cecil E. Nelson, Hallock, Minnesota; S/sgt. Jerald V. Owens, Haile; and cpl. David W. Smith, Monroe.

The Professor of Military Science Medal for outstanding leadership in ROTC activities was presented by Lt. Col. Meredith L. Shumaker to cadets It. col. Jerry L. Miller, Marion; It. James I. Kemp, West Monroe, received the award from the Barkdull Faulk Post, American Legion, for distinction in having earned the highest two year average in basic military science, and for leadership demonstrated in the classroom and on the drill field. Gordon Will Speak At NLSC May 6 To Beta Sigma Group

Dr. Robert E. Gordon, editor of the American Midland Naturalist and assistant professor of biology at the University of Notre Dame, will speak at the May 16 meeting of Beta Sigma at Northeast Louisiana State College.

Dr. Gordon, a former Northeast faculty member will speak on "Some Problems of Communication in Science" at the 5:15 meeting of Beta Sigma, the Northeast biology club, in the College Union auditorium, according to Edward Whatley, associate professor of biology.

The biologist will also lecture to several zoology 2 classes Friday and Saturday, May 17-18, and will be available to talk to students concerning career opportunities in biology.

Gordon was assistant professor of biology at Northeast from Septem-ber, 1954, until August, 1958, when he went to Notre Dame. He holds a bachelor's degree from Emory Un-iversity, a master's from the Uni-versity of Georgia and a Ph.D from Tulane.

He has had articles published in the Texas Journal of Science and Copeia, in addition to the American Midland Naturalist.



NLSC Signs Lisbon High Star-Saulters

Northeast Louisiana State Saturday

Northeast Louisiana State Saturday landed one of the South's top recruiting prizes — Lisbon all-state basketball and baseball star Glynn Saulters. Sought by 17 colleges and universities and several major league baseball teams, Saulters signed a grant-in-aid agreement with Northeast in Monroe Saturday afternoon. The 6-2, 165-pound athlete was named to the all-state basketball team selected by Louisiana coaches in 1962 and was chosen on the class C all-state dub by both coaches and sports writers this year. He has been a member of the Louisiana Sports Writers Association all-state baseball team for the past two seasons and is a heavy favorite to make the 1963 team.

Son of Lisbon coach Grady Saul-rs, Glynn paced his basketball team to the state semi-finals this year, where Lisbon lost a 62-60 thriller to

Baseballers Drop Twinbill, 4-0, 6-3, To Tech Bulldogs

Northeast State's baseball team ended its 1963 season on a sour note Monday afternoon with a 4-0 and 6-3 doubleheader loss to Louisiana Tech in Ruston.

The double loss dropped the Indians below the .500 mark for the season with a 13 and 14 record overall, and 8 and 12 in the Gulf States Conference.

The afternoon was somewhat frus-The afternoon was somewhat frustrating for the Indian batsmen who could accumulate but nine hits in both games. In the opener the Indians managed only four hits off Tech's ace righthander George Woodson who went the distance to pick up his sixth win against only two losses.

In the second tilt, the Indians were a bit more fortunate, connecting for five hits, including a double by Keith Prince and a homerun by John Hall. Both Northeast pitchers, Ed Quimby and Bobby Lockwood, went the distance.

The two wins gave Tech a 9-8 GSC record and a 10-9 overall slate.

Holden, the eventual champion. Saulters scored 32 points in that semifinal game.

For the full season, Saulters averaged 21.4 points and was also a crack rebounder. His scoring average was the third highest among class C players in the state. In his junior season, he averaged 17.7 points a game. In addition to his all-state laurels, the Lisbon star has been named to the all-district 5-C team three times and the all-regional team twice.

During the past two years, Saulters has been named to the all-tournament team in every tournament his team has participated in, 17 in all.

The 18-year-old athlete plays shortstop and pitcher in baseball. In 1961 he was named to the all-state team as a shortstop and last year as a pitcher.

In 1962 Glynn was voted the state's most outstanding player in all three of his club's games in the tournament in Baton Rouge.

A righthander, he won eight games and lost only one last season and has a 4-1 mound record so far this year. At the plate, he hit, 386 last year and is batting 328 this

Pennel Tries For New Record; Tribe After Fourth GSC Crown

Next stop for Northeast Louisiana State's track team and pole vault champ John Pennel is Ruston and tomorrow night's Gulf States Conference track and field meet.

Coach Bob Groseclose's thinclads will attempt to win their second straight GSC title and their fourth in five years tomorrow night.

Last Saturday Northeast won the team championship of its own Northeast Invitational, scoring 68 points to 56 for defending Southeastern Conference champion Mississippi State. Southwestern Louisiana was third with 52 points, East Texas State had 46, Louisiana Tech 43 and Northwestern 35.

For Coliseum Relays

John Pennel, world record holder in the pole vault, and unbeaten quarter-miler Randall Walker of Northeast State College will compete in the giant Coliseum Relays in Los Angeles, Calif., May 17.

Pennel's and Walker's acceptance of invitations to the 23rd annual Coliseum meet was announced Tuesday by Northeast State Coach Bob Groseclose and Athletic Director Jack Rowan. The two athlete's expenses will be paid by the Coliseum Relays.

Both Pennel and Walker are seniors, the only four-year men on the Northeast team.

Walker, from Hallsville, Tex., is unbeaten in the 440 for the past two years. He has won the Gulf States Conference quarter the past two years and also won the 220-yard low hurdles in the 1961 meet. He holds both the GSC and Sugar Bowl Meet 440 records, 47.4 in the GSC and 47.8 in the Sugar Bowl.

Walker's career best in the quarter is 47.3, run last Saturday in the Northeast Invitational here, but he is considered by his coach to be capable of much faster times with strong competition.

Pennel set the world record of 16-634 in the vault in a dual meet here April 30 and has cleared 16 feet or better seven times, more than any other vaulter in the world.

In the Coliseum Relays, Pennel will be shooting for the meet record, now held by John Uelses, the first man to clear 16 feet, with a 16-1/4 last year. A strong field has been lined up to face the Northeast star, including Fred Hansen of Rice, C. K. Yang of UCLA, Rolando Cruz, Ron Morris of the Los Angeles Striders and Dave Tork—all of whom have cleared 16 feet once or more.

Northeast took five firsts in the Invitational. Pennel won the vault with 16-0, missing on three attempts at 16-8. His clearance of 16 feet was his seventh in six weeks, more than any other vaulter ever.

Anchored by Randall Walker's fine 46.4 anchor leg, Northeast won the mile relay in 3:11.4, one of the nation's fastest times, to clinch the victory. Cline Averett ran 48.3 off the blocks, Mike Wilson had a 49.7 and John Baker a 47.0 in the triumph.

Walker picked up a first in the 440 when he won in 47.3, his best time of the spring and a track record.

Northeast's tireless freshman star, Dalton LeBlanc, picked up the other first with a 14.4 in the high hurdles and a 23.7 around the curve-in the 220-yard lows. LeBlanc also finished third in the 220 and ran a leg on the third-place sprint relay team for a total of 14½ points, giving him a total of 124½ points, giving him a total of 124½ for the year, tops on the team.

the team.

The second-place performance by Tommy Edmonson in the vault was probably the most encouraging development in the meet. The Baton Rouge sophomore cleared 14-6, his highest ever. Edmonson cleared 14-0 in his first outdoor college meet in 1962 and numerous times since but had never gone higher until Saturday. Groseclose hopes that the blond vaulter will continue to improve and reach the 15-foot class next season.

Englishman Malcolm Robinson of Southwestern was voted the outstanding track man at the Invitational with Pennel taking outstanding field man honors. Robinson, a sophomore from London, ran the nation's fastest two-mile of the year, 8:47.8, and also won the mile in 4:09.0.

Lettermen, Award Winners Will Be Honored Tuesday

Lettermen and award winners in seven sports will be honored at Northeast State's all-sports banquet Tuesday night in Gunby Dining Hall.

Participants in football, cross country, bas-ketball, baseball, golf, tennis and track will attend the banquet, which will begin at 7 o'clock, along with Northeast Booster Club directors, members of the college athletic council, members of the coaching staff, col-lege officials and Northeast recruits.

Athletic Director Jack Rowan said that be-cause of the large number of awards to be presented, no speaker has been scheduled for the banquet.
