The platform of the TIC Party is as follows.

Platform

- (1) The TIC Party will establish a Student Union. This is an organization set up much like the SGA. It has no responsibility other than to provide entertainment for the students.
- (2) We will initiate a program of involving students in the disciplinary process on campus. Not only will such a program increase the student voice in campus affairs, but it will also allow more students to participate in the governmental process.
- (3) We will continue to cooperate with the college administration and with the NLSC Alumni Association in an effort to provide a recreational area on Bayou DeSiard as a part of the campus.
- (4) We will investigate the food services system and explore the possibilities of establishing a computer-type meal plan.
- (5) We will seek to improve the relations between the SGA and the College administration in order to obtain a more mutually profitable relationship. We shall accomplish this by increasing the prestige of the SGA in the eyes of the administrative officials.
- (6) We will create a better working relation with the students by:
 - (A) Insisting that the members of the Student Senate represent their respective constituents,
 - (B) Involving students who are not members of the Student

Platform

The United Students Party platform is as follows.

- (1) Communication . . . to keep students better informed about SGA and administrative activities by publishing bi-monthly newsletter for students and sending a copy to every campus organization; by establishing mail pick-up in the lobbies of every dormitory on campus; and work with dorm council members to establish better communication between students and SGA by providing polls in the dorms.
 - (2) Continue with programs already started by the United Students Party. These being bayou development, teacher evaluation, student union and campus radio.
- ### Student Rate
- (3) Work with local merchants to establish student discount rates.
 - (4) Gripe Day . . . establish a monthly forum in which students can vocally express their views to the SGA and the administration.
 - (5) Work with the Women's dorm council to promote better dorm hours for women students.
 - (6) Establish better library hours on weekends.
 - (7) Food committee to investigate and improve dining conditions on the campus.
 - (8) Draw up plans for a 20-foot Indian to be placed on campus for beautification, pep rallies, football games, etc.

Every community must have leaders if it is to function in a democratic manner. These leaders are responsible to the students who elect them; therefore it is the duty of the students to elect responsible officials.

At present the Northeast campus is engaged in a whirlwind of election activities during which all Student Government Association positions for the 1967-68 term will be filled.

The effectiveness of the SGA depends on the people that the student body puts in office. In the past, and this year is no exception, a few have been known to hurt the SGA, just as they damage any organization.

Some look upon the SGA race as another popularity contest. They seek office to put their names, or the name of their fraternity or sorority, before the public. Sometimes one of these lands a government position because they are unopposed.

This is not to say that fraternity and sorority members cannot be good members of the government; several have proved themselves otherwise this year.

Membership in a social organization, however, should not be considered by the voter as a qualification for office.

Students elected to SGA should be those who are willing to work. An SGA member's job is not one of play—or it shouldn't be. Their work is constant and time consuming—or should be—and not leisure.

Students should organize to promote capable candidates. Students seeking popularity should run for class favorites.

Many past elections have all too often resembled popularity contests instead of serious campaigns for responsible student government positions. Few candidates have offered constructive platforms embodying needed reforms. The trend has been to continue the policies of the outgoing officers. Will this be the year for a change?

Hopefully, some of the aspirants to campus office will come up with a strong platform, with some sweeping changes for the betterment of SGA instead of depending on their good looks, personality or popularity as their asset.

Will this be an exciting wide-open race . . . or the dead pan caliber? Will the SGA be a dance and school spirit committee?

The potentiality of this year's slate of candidates seems very good . . . but will the outcome of tomorrow's election see a "new" and "better" Northeast of the future?

With the proper thought, study and election of "good" candidates in the right offices, we believe the SGA will once again be a student government.

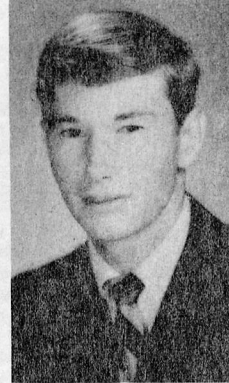

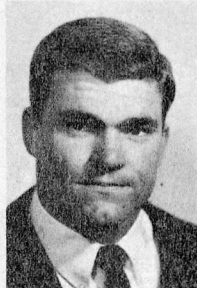

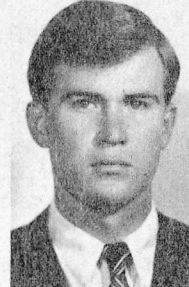
